Observe **World Labyrinth Day** by walking the elaborate path at Armenian Heritage Park on the Rose Fitzgerald Kennedy Greenway. Study the park's newly reconfigured *Abstract Sculpture*, which changes shape annually, symbolizing the immigrant experience.
